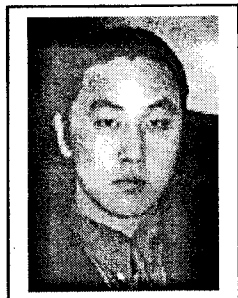

KAMSA had its first Masterclass for Violin and Cello on May 22nd and 23rd in New Community Church in Mt.

Prof. Melikian talked about vibrato, importance of correct music reading, ending the phrases, slides, how to practice on certain techniques, how to open the solo part after the orchestra introduction, etc.

Prof. Wilson talked about, again, good and correct reading, especially in rhythm, relaxing and projecting the sound in performance, posture etc.

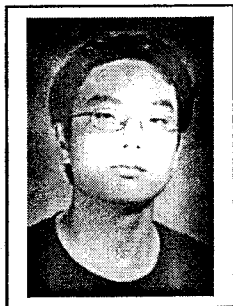

Being able to take part of KAMSA this year was a great opportunity to improve my skills on trombone with a big group of very talented friends. Catching up to play with the conductor's standards was a huge deal to me. Since it was my first year playing with an orchestra, I felt nervous. I was afraid that the conductor would pick on me. Due to the shortage of time for my brother and me (we went to Korea and came back about 3 weeks before the first rehearsal), we practiced as if a monster was going to eat us if we did not practice. After we finished practicing for the day, our lips would be sore and we would have many cuts in our mouths (we had braces). I was wondering whether or not this would all pay off. The day of the first rehearsal came and I was incredibly nervous. I was wondering whether I should skip the whole KAMSA. Unfortunately, I could not, because I was bound to a promise to one of the members of the board, Mrs. Mela Hwang. I promised I would practice hard. When I went into the practice hall, everyone seemed to know each other, and they were quite relaxed. We started rehearsing and I had a hard time finding

confidence in myself. As the days went on, with the help from Jonathan (a senior trombone player), I started improving little by little and I started finding confidence in myself. I started to believe I was ready for the concert. The concert day went by like a blur to me, but I still remember several things. I remember sweating in the intense heat of the concert hall and practicing all the songs one last time. I remember hitting the notes solidly, gaining more confidence, and even enjoying playing the music. I remember missing a couple of notes and was hoping that nobody noticed. I remember the incredibly confusing ending (I could not tell if we were done or not. The conductor went on and off the stage about ten times). I remember the long applause from the audience.

Looking back, in spite of the sore lips, cuts in my mouth, nervousness, and the incredibly long practice, I have to say I felt really good being a part of KAMSA orchestra. Believe it or not, I am looking forward to the next concert already. Besides, people tell me that we all look pretty good in our suits and ties.

This season's featured soloists were Christine Choi on *Saint-Saens Violin Concerto* and Jordan Han on *Dvorak's Cello Concerto*. Two Korean Songs arranged for Orchestra were featured; *Heunhwaga* by Prof. Chanhae Lee of Yonsei University and *On the Taehwa River* by Prof. Geonyong Lee of the Korean National University of Art. Second half of the concert was *Beethoven's Symphony No.5 in c minor op.67*. This very well known piece, always wonderful to listen to and perform, one of the master composition of Beethoven, played by our young musician left indescribable impression to all audience. As encore the orchestra played *Gohyang eui Bom*.
